With the opening of splashy new eatery **JP Atlanta**, 91-year-old John C. Portman Jr. shows no signs of slowing down. The esteemed Georgia Tech alum's first foray into fine dining dates back to beloved haute spot The Midnight Sun at Peachtree Center, a 27-story tower built in 1965 by Portman. Today, his design for the refined restaurant features a showstopping 20-foot skylight, glass canopy-topped bar and floating grand staircase.
